Meet **Don Potter-Edwards** who studied History at Bangor University 2008-2011. Don mainly focused on the more modern social and political modules taught in the School and graduated with 2:2 BA in History. Since leaving university Don qualified as a Vehicle Technician through an apprenticeship with BT Fleet and is now focused on forwarding his career within the business.

Caroline Potter-Edwards studied History at Bangor from 2008 - 2013. In her own words, Caroline 'enjoyed studying modern, social history, particularly my undergrad dissertation on Mods and Rockers in the South-East' and graduated with first class honours (BA) and merit (MA).

Caroline started working in the NHS in 2010 as a summer job and is now a Commissioning Project Manager in Mental Health for two local Clinical Commissioning Groups.



Adele Thackray came to Bangor University, as a mature student in 2005 to do a BA (hons) in History with Archaeology. Whilst studying Adele secured work placement with the Local Archaeological Trust which led onto employment as a trainee archaeologist on a very exciting multi-period site on Anglesey. This then progressed to a position of Finds Officer, cataloguing and identifying artefacts from 6000-year-old pottery sherds to early medieval skeletons.



When Adele graduated from Bangor University with a 2:1 in 2008, she was offered a position in Heritage Management piloting a Monuments at Risk database, which meant collating all the information for all the monuments in North West Wales. She also began her Masters in Celtic

Archaeology at Bangor University and lectured in Prehistory part-time. Since 2010 Adele has worked in the Welsh Governments Historic Environment Service, Cadw.

After gaining a 2:1 BA (Hons) University of Liverpool in Archaeology and History, **Erin Lloyd Jones** has worked for the National Trust as Visitor Services Manager at Erddig, for the Heritage Lottery Funded 'Heather and Hillforts Project' in north east Wales, and as a Graduate Teaching Assistant in Archaeology at Bangor University

before beginning her role as Lifelong Learning Manager for Cadw, and later becoming Cadw's Heritage Interpretation Manager.

Erin came to Bangor University as a postgraduate student to investigate the hillforts north east Wales and borderlands. Having now worked in the heritage sector for over ten years, she cheekily describes herself as 'Indiana Lloyd Jones' - getting people excited about archaeology!



Mark Hughes graduated with an MA in History from Bangor in 2012. He then joined UK Civil Service as an Administrative Officer in the Department for Works and Pensions, making decisions surrounding family maintenance and securing financial protection for vulnerable children. Mark now works for the Department for Communities and Local Government on European funded projects which include assessing and making recommendations on proposals for eligibility and regional strategic impact; acting as a secretariat to local regional committees; and contract management.

Marc Collinson is a part-time PhD student in Modern History. After graduating with a BA in Modern & Contemporary History, Marc continued his studies at Bangor University, completing a self-funded MA in 2012. After a year out, which included a brief spell working in the University Library, Mark started his PhD on the Labour Party and immigration policy in the 1960s and 1970s.



Marc funds his studies by working part-time—he is a part-time teaching assistant within the School—and securing small grants which from academic societies and charities, to assist with fees, maintenance and research travel costs. This year, Marc is looking forward to presenting a paper at a conference organised by researchers at the Sorbonne Nouvelle University as well as giving a paper on Roy Jenkins at the international NAASWCH conference held at Harvard University.

catalogio ac yn nodi arteffactau, o ddarnau crochenwaith 6000 oed i sgerbydau o'r oesoedd canol cynnar.

Pan raddiodd Adele o Brifysgol Bangor gyda 2:1 yn 2008,

cynigiwyd gwaith iddi'n Rheoli Treftadaeth, yn gyfrifol am gronfa ddata Henebion mewn Perygl, a oedd yn golygu cyfod yr holl wybodaeth am yr holl henebion yng ngogledd-orllewin Cymru. Dechreuodd ei gradd Meistr mewn Archeoleg Geltaidd ym Mhrifysgol Bangor, a darlithio'n rhan amser ar Gynhanes hefyd. Ers 2010 mae Adele wedi bod yn gweithio yng Ngwasanaeth Amgylchedd Hanesyddol Llywodraeth Cymru, Cadw.

Graddiodd **Mark Hughes** gydag MA mewn Hanes o Fangor yn 2012. Ymunodd wedyn â Gwasanaeth Sifil y DU fel Swyddog Gweinyddol yn yr Adran Gwaith a Phensiynau, yn gwneud penderfyniadau ar gynnal teuluoedd a sicrhau diogelwch ariannol i blant agored i niwed. Mae Mark bellach yn gweithio i'r Adran Cymunedau a Llywodraeth Leol ar brojectau a gyllidir gan Ewrop sy'n cynnwys asesu a gwneud awgrymiadau ar gynigion am gymhwyster ac effaith strategol ranbarthol; gweithredu fel ysgrifennydd i bwyllgorau rhanbarthol lleol; a rheoli contractau.
