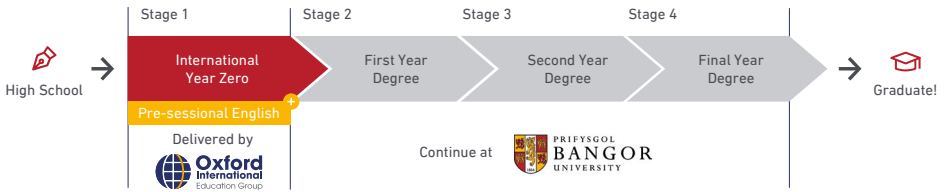

INTERNATIONAL INCORPORATED BACHELORS (IIB)

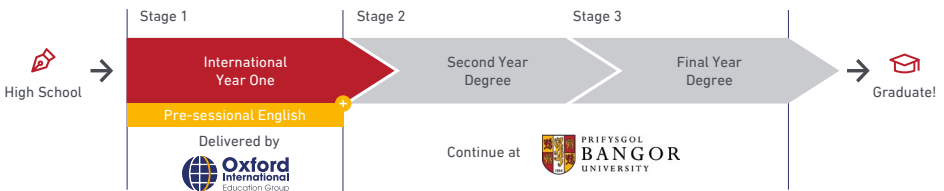
International Year Zero (IYZ)

This IYZ at BUIC is the first year of a 4-year integrated degree course. IYZ provides 1-year of preparation for entry into the first year of a 3-year bachelor's degree at Bangor University.



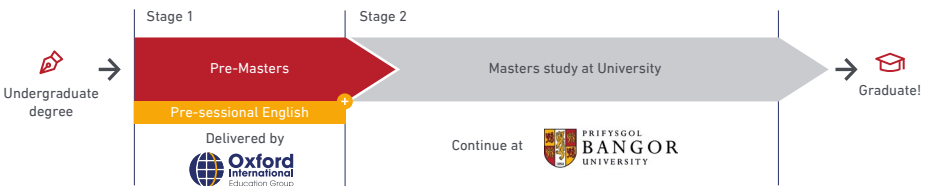
International Year One (IY1)

The IY1 at BUIC is the first year of a 3-year integrated degree course. IY1 is equivalent to the first year of a 3-year bachelor's degree, leading to direct entry into the second year of a bachelor's degree at Bangor University.



INTERNATIONAL INCORPORATED MASTERS (IIM)

The IIM at BUIC is an integrated degree course, providing either 1 term or 2 terms of preparation for entry into a 1-year master's degree in accounting, banking, business, finance or psychology at Bangor University.



PRE-SESSIONAL ENGLISH

Provides you with an initial period of intensive English language training and assessments. This academic English support is delivered over half a term (6 weeks) or one full term (12 weeks). You will need to successfully complete this before you can continue onto your chosen pathway. The number of weeks you complete will depend on your current English level. See more on the applicable IIB or IIM course pages.



BLENDED LEARNING

BUIC is committed to delivering an excellent student experience without compromising your safety. This means that we provide you with a blended learning experience which combines online and campus-based learning.

Careers advice

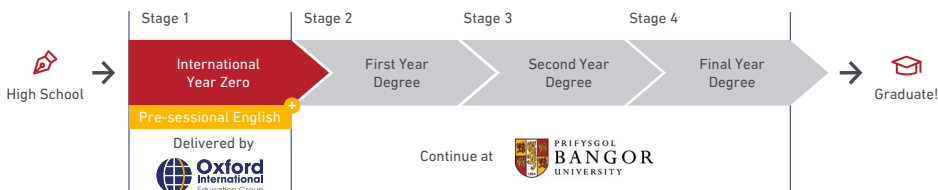

International Year Zero (IYZ) stages of entry

The IYZ is the first year of the 4-year IIB. Your first year is taught at BUIC. Once you successfully complete this year, you will continue studying the remaining stages of your degree directly with Bangor University.



The IIB degree offers a 4-year degree option at Bangor University in a range of popular subjects. International Year Zero (IYZ) is the first year of your IIB and is designed to help you gain extra skills in your subject area, as well as English language. IYZ is studied across three terms.

COMMON MODULES FOR ALL IYZ PATHWAYS

As well as modules unique to your specific pathway, you will also study several modules common to all pathways. These modules are:

English for Academic Purposes (EAP)

EAP aims to improve your English skills to help you with life and study in the UK. You'll learn the critical importance of English Language competence in an academic context and prepare for continuing academic study at Bangor University.

UK Government and Society

Providing an introduction to government and society in the UK, this module explores how Britain has changed and developed since 1945. You'll learn the main features of British democracy, the crown, Parliament, cabinet government, devolution, local government and the role of the civil service. The module also introduces you to the key features of British society and changes that have taken place in recent decades around issues of class, ethnicity, gender, rights and obligations, as well as considering how Britain relates to, influences and is influenced by the wider world.

Information Technology and Communication Skills

In this module, you'll focus on appropriate means of communication in academic work and developing a foundation in computing and IT skills that will enable you to be successful in your undergraduate studies. You'll become familiar with the conventions of academic discourse and writing, and learn to avoid plagiarism and poor academic practice. You'll also develop skills in word processing and spreadsheets to ensure you submit assignments appropriately, as well as using PowerPoint to deliver more effective presentations.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Compulsory modules include:

Business Functions

A basic introduction to the study of business and management, this module introduces the function of marketing in different types of businesses and organisations. It considers issues around the liberalisation of trade and the development of the global market and how they have affected businesses and the emergence of the international manager.

Business Law

Providing you with a functional knowledge of the basic rights and liabilities in law affecting modern businesses, this module covers types of business entity, such as partnerships and companies. You will learn about the legal system in England and Wales, including the small claims track, and the rights and responsibilities of businesses in this legal framework.

Financial Accounting

Covering the basic

mechanics and processes of financial accounting in theory and practice, this module prepares you for the later years of your degree studies in Business Management and Accounting and Finance. It will also give you an understanding of financial accounting procedures and their importance in monitoring progress and profitability to run a business effectively.

Macroeconomics

Familiarising you with the UK economy and government policy, this module also introduces key macroeconomic indicators, including GDP per capita, price indices and balance of payments. You'll learn about fiscal and monetary policy aims, the desire for growth and the relationship between policy and rates of inflation, deflation and unemployment. National goals are viewed in the context of broader groupings such as the EU, and the impact of the development of a global market.

Management Studies

In this module, you'll receive a basic introduction to the study of business and management. You'll learn the different

types of businesses and organisations, as well as how to finance a start-up. The module also illustrates different approaches to management and explains decision-making processes.

Mathematics for Business and the Social Sciences

In this module, you will learn the maths skills expected of you at degree level. It covers essential mathematical language, notation, conventions and units, as well as developing your algebraic skills and introducing you to basic statistical concepts, topics and methods.

Microeconomics

Providing a basic introduction to the study of Microeconomics, this module introduces relevant theories, concepts and terminology as well as explaining key topics such as demand and supply, the economic problem and the allocation of scarce resources.

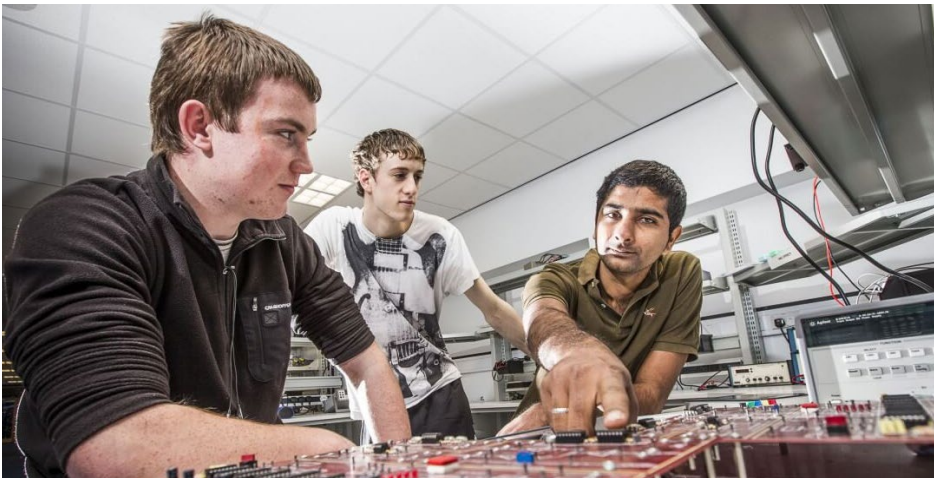
ABOUT THE COURSE

Covering the major mathematical and scientific principles, this course gives you a great start in engineering and computing. With a heavy focus on maths, physics and programming, you will deepen your understanding of these subjects during your foundation year.

After finishing the course, you will continue your studies in either our School of Computer Science where you will obtain a BSc degree that is accredited by the British Computer Society or you will join our School of Electronic Engineering with its range of specialist courses. Our BEng degree courses, which are accredited by the Institution of Engineering and Technology, can set you on the road to Chartered Engineer Status.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Compulsory modules include:

Database Design and Usage

This module is a practical introduction to the technology and terminology around tabular data, and the construction and use of a database. You will develop a database for a given situation – for example, a simulated business using current standards and appropriate software – and use that database to identify and solve problems.

Electricity, Electronics and Fields

This module provides you with a basic knowledge of electricity and electronics, and of fields, that you will be able to apply in real engineering and computing situations. You will learn about current and charge, Ohm's Law, capacitors in DC circuits, measuring AC, transistors and logic circuits.

Further Mathematics

This module covers complex mathematical skills and knowledge, such as: algebra, including partial fractions and inverse functions; the circle;

trigonometry; differentiation and integration, including trigonometric, and logarithmic and exponential functions; and solving first-order differential equations with separable variables, vector and vector methods in two and three dimensions, and forces as fixed vectors.

Mechanics

Continuing to develop your maths skills and knowledge, this module introduces you to the relationships between forces, linear motion and energy, and the conditions for the static equilibrium of a body. The main topics it covers are: vectors; forces and equilibrium; relative motion; Newton's Laws of Motion; friction, including Hooke's Law; and work, energy and power, including work and kinetic energy, and the conservation of mechanical energy.

Problem Solving and Programming

Introducing you to problem solving via computer applications, you'll develop a basic understanding of algorithms and their uses, as well as gaining hands-on experience using simple software programs to solve problems. You will receive a basic introduction to the techniques of data handling and processing, and to the

syntax of programming languages required for a computing degree

Properties of Matter and Waves

In this module, you'll gain a basic knowledge of atomic physics, materials, heat and gases, and oscillations and waves. There is a heavy emphasis on safe laboratory practice and procedures. The main topics covered are: properties of waves; sound; reflection and refraction; interference and diffraction; and electromagnetic waves.

Pure Mathematics

This module provides you with the appropriate foundation in maths skills that you need for undergraduate studies in engineering and computer science. The main topics covered are: algebra, including indices and logarithms; binomial theorem and quadratic equations; differential calculus; integration as the inverse of differentiation; set theory; and probability and experimental laws.

This broad-based pathway will give you an excellent grounding for undergraduate degrees in a variety of areas, including Media, Law, Sociology and Psychology.

After completing the first stage at BUIC, you will continue your chosen degree in the School of Social Sciences, School of Law, School of Psychology or School of Creative Studies & Media.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Legal System of England and Wales

Introducing key features of the legal system of England and Wales, this module covers its principles and processes. You will learn about the different types and levels of court, including the jury system and the roles of judges, barristers, solicitors and court officials, as well as processes around civil and criminal cases.

Management Studies

In this module, you'll receive a basic introduction to the study of business and management. You'll learn the different types of businesses and organisations, as well as how to finance a start-up.

Mathematics for Business and the Social Sciences

In this module, you will learn the maths skills expected of you at degree level. It covers essential mathematical language, notation, conventions, as well as developing your algebraic skills and introducing you to basic statistical concepts, topics and methods.

Media Studies (News Media)

You will be introduced to key concepts underpinning a range of media activities in this module. It considers the role and impact of the mass media in the UK – both print and digital – in the context of wider society, through a study of the news media.

Microeconomics

Providing a basic introduction to the study of Microeconomics, this module introduces relevant theories, concepts and terminology as well as explaining key topics such as demand and supply, the economic problem and the allocation of scarce resources.

Macroeconomics

Familiarising you with the UK economy and government policy, this module also introduces key macroeconomic indicators, including GDP per capita, price indices and balance of payments.

Business Law (Compulsory for progression to Law degrees)

Providing you with a functional knowledge of the basic rights and liabilities in law affecting modern businesses, this module covers types of business

entity, such as partnerships and companies.

Media Studies (Film and TV) (Compulsory for progression to Media degrees)

This module aims to broaden your knowledge of critical and cultural theory in media. You will develop an understanding of the theoretical aspects of film and TV production, with an emphasis on story-telling.

Psychology (Compulsory for progression to Psychology degrees)

To introduce the main theoretical approaches to Psychology and consider its historical development as a field of study; to build awareness of key ideas and concepts; to focus on the areas of Social, Cognitive and Developmental Psychology; and to introduce Research methods and related ethical considerations.

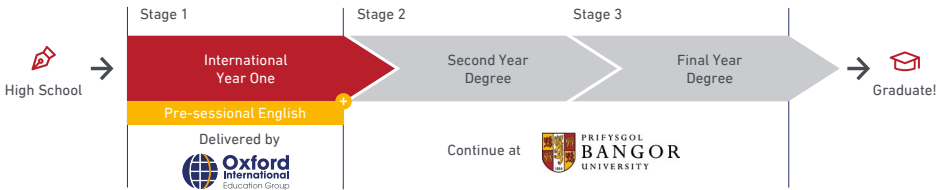
IIB INTERNATIONAL YEAR ONE (IY1)

International Year One (IY1) stages of entry

The IY1 is the first year of the 3-year IIB and is taught at BUIC. The IY1 is the equivalent to your first year of study at undergraduate level. Once you successfully complete this year, you will move straight to the second year of your degree study directly with Bangor University.



The International Year One (IY1) provides an intensive combination of first year university subjects modules with extra study and English language skills.

The IY1 is the first year of the 3-year International Incorporated Bachelors (IIB) degree. Upon successful completion of the IY1, you will continue to the second year of your chosen degree at study at Bangor University.

COMMON MODULES FOR ALL IY1 PATHWAYS

As well as modules unique to your specific pathway, you will study one module common to all pathways. This module is:

English for University Learning

In this module you will receive training in academic writing, reading for study in higher education, listening in the higher education environment, speaking and listening in seminars, and university study skills. You'll improve your ability to communicate and participate in an academic environment using the English language, and transfer your English language knowledge and skills to support learning across a range of subjects in business, finance, economics and Psychology.

ABOUT THE COURSE

Our IY1 course is the first year of a business management and finance related degree. You will learn core subjects relating to management, economics and accounting. On successful completion, you will continue onto the second year of your chosen undergraduate degree with Bangor Business School.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Business Project and Study Skills

In this module you will develop and apply academic and study skills, including the skills of synthesising source material, presenting analysis and production of a final extended research essay with bibliography, and the delivery of a group-based presentation.

Financial and Management Accounting

In financial accounting you will study the principles and practice of double-entry bookkeeping, as well as developing a broader understanding of accounting concepts, principles and conventions. You will learn how to record transactions and prepare annual financial statements; and how to analyse, interpret and communicate the information contained in financial statements, and explain their limitations.

Introduction to Business and Marketing

This module provides an understanding of a range

of activities associated with corporate, operational, functional aims, objectives, strategies and strategic decision making. Topics include tactical decision making, operational management, human resource management or managing people, organisational structures, managing change, and the relationship between management, shareholders, and other stakeholders.

Introduction to Economics

In microeconomics you will examine the workings of the free-market economy, and see how economic decisions in respect of the allocation of scarce resources are shaped by market forces through the interactions between demand and supply. Production and cost theory, and the economic theory of the firm are examined, and you will debate the role of government in safeguarding the interests of consumers and producers, promoting competition, and improving efficiency.

Mathematics for Business and Finance

This module introduces mathematics and statistical techniques that are essential for further study in business, finance and economics. You will learn how to solve

mathematical equations and use mathematics as a tool for decision-making in business, management and finance. You will learn how to describe data using graphical and numerical methods, and use probability to describe situations of uncertainty.

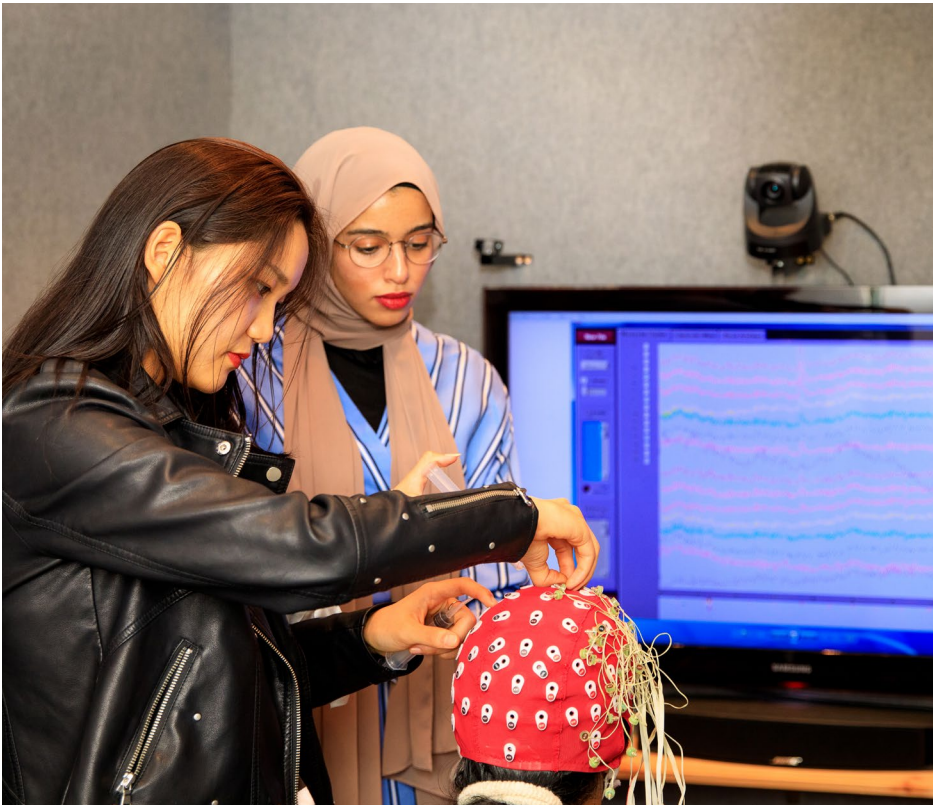

ABOUT THE COURSE

A psychology degree opens up a variety of career options, such as a professional psychologist as well as other disciplines such as healthcare, teaching, marketing, or management. Even if you decide to ultimately not join the world of psychology, the analytical, and research skills you gain will make you a high-quality candidate for many organisations.

Our IY1 in Psychology at BUIC offers you an alternative route to a BSc (Hons) Psychology degree. Once you have completed this first stage at BUIC, you will continue directly with Bangor University. Recently rated Top 10 in the UK for student satisfaction by the NSS 2019, Bangor University is home to one of the largest and most cosmopolitan psychology departments in the UK.



WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Applied Psychology

This module looks at ways in which psychological training, theory and research can apply to real-life situations. In addition to clinical, educational psychology and counselling, you will also look at forensic psychology, the impact of psychological insights in the world of business and management and urban planning. The module will show how an understanding of human attitudes, reactions and behaviours influences decision-making in all these areas.

Behavioural Psychology

You will consider the link between behaviour and the mind, conditioning and the interaction with the environment. What defines rational and abnormal behaviour and why behaviours are so difficult to influence or adjust are discussed. Additionally, this course reviews mental health problems, including stress, anomalous psychology and the experience of the

paranormal. You will also consider positive psychology and the science of happiness and well-being.

Biological Psychology

You will learn the principles of biological psychology, considering the anatomy of the brain and how the brain influences the mind, so affecting behaviour. You will examine the different location of mental functions and behaviours and how the brain may be affected by injury or neurological disorder. Elements of cognitive psychology are explored, including memory and language acquisition.

Research Methods

This module aims to introduce you to the research methods and statistics used within Psychology. You will learn about using the correct scientific method for planning, undertaking and interpreting research.

Scientific Communication

This module teaches you how to communicate within a scientific setting clearly and effectively, both in writing and verbally. You will study scientific texts and listen to lectures and write summaries of what you learnt from this. This style of learning will provide

you with the opportunities to demonstrate your understanding of and ability to engage with scientific writing. Students will also be required to work in groups, discussing current Psychology topics.

Social Psychology

This module will look into psychological theories in Social Psychology. Students will get an introduction into interpersonal relationships, attitude formation, structure and change, social influence and group dynamics. This course allows students to explore human behaviour in a social and cultural context.

The IIM courses are designed for students who do not qualify for direct entry to postgraduate degree courses at Bangor University.

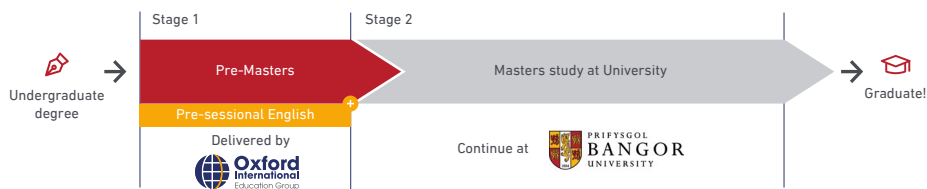
The Pre-Master's stage of our IIM focuses on equipping you with the business or psychology related subjects knowledge and the advanced study and English language skills you need to complete your postgraduate study at Bangor University.

There are two options depending on your English language level:

- 15 months IIM (One Term Pre-Masters)
 - start dates in September*, April and June
- 18 month IIM (Two Term Pre-Masters)
 - start dates in January, April and June*

You can choose from four routes:

- Accounting and Finance
- Business and Management
- Investment and Banking
- Psychology



PRE-SESSIONAL ENGLISH

This course features additional academic English language support. COMMON MODULES FOR ALL IIM PROGRAMMES

As well as modules unique to your specific pathway, you will also study several modules that are common to all pathways. These common modules are:

Introduction to Postgraduate Study in the UK

This module introduces the structure, demands and expectations of postgraduate study in business or psychology in the UK. There is an emphasis on the development of academic skills of particular relevance to postgraduate study, including research methods. You will be encouraged to become more independent, reflective and critical, as well as developing group-working and team-building skills.

English for IIM Preparation 1 and 2 (Two Term only)

These modules prepare you for study at Master's level at Bangor University, by raising your English language standard from a minimum of 5.5 IELTS to 6.0 IELTS or higher. You will continue to increase linguistic competence and boost confidence in the use of English. There is emphasis on the development of critical and analytical ability, evaluation and creative engagement with study materials, and the development of skills as an independent learner.

Business English (Two Term only excludes Psychology)

This module introduces and develops English skills directly relevant to the academic study of business. You will develop an understanding of basic business models, explore and interpret business source materials, and use these and other learning materials in business case studies designed to enhance understanding of how business works in practice.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Auditing

This module considers the importance to a business of the monitoring of its financial performance, both in terms of meeting the requirements of the regulatory environment within which businesses operate and of providing information of a company's performance and its financial standing to its executive and shareholders. The external auditing process is reviewed, including evidence requiring to be produced, compliance tests and substantive tests, analytical review and computer-assisted audit techniques, completion checklist and the final auditor's report and the need for properly submitted accounts to the Registrar of Companies.

Financial Accounting

The aim of this module is to provide an introduction to accounting in terms of theory and practice and covers the main applications of ICT to financial accounting. It provides you

with an understanding of the technical aspects of the subject, including double-entry bookkeeping, calculation of key ratios and the preparation and use of financial statements with a focus on limited liability companies. It considers appropriate UK practice but focuses on International Accounting Standard practice.

Finance, Investment & Banking

The main aim of this module is to provide you with an introduction to corporate finance. You will examine the concepts and principles underlying key financial decisions, risk and return, the evaluation of projected capital investment and analysis of financial performance, for example. The module further offers insights into the nature of the financial instruments, financial markets and financial intermediaries, with particular focus on the banking business.

Management Accounting

This module focuses on the techniques of management accounting that are used to collect, process, and present financial and quantitative data within an organisation to aid performance management,

cost control, planning and pricing and, through these, the process of managerial decision-making. You will be made aware of the major accounting concepts and of how financial statements are used to support companies in their measurement of profit and valuation of assets and in their planning for future strategic moves and developments.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Business Environment

This module introduces you to economic theories and systems and relates these to the environment within which businesses function. You will further be equipped with the critical skills to apply the concepts and principles you study in a business context. You will be taught to consider the impact of government policies and actions on businesses and to look beyond national policies to the influence of wider economic and political groupings of states.

Business Strategy and Marketing

This module provides an understanding of key concepts, recent developments and issues within the study of strategic decision-making within business organisations with an emphasis on a critically evaluative approach to approach and outcomes. You are also introduced to the theories and concepts of marketing as a business function and will relate

theory to practice in terms of setting a company's marketing objectives, formulating and implementing a marketing strategy, sales and promotional activities, market research and the impact of technology on marketing activities.

Finance, Investment & Banking

The main aim of this module is to provide you with an introduction to corporate finance. You will examine the concepts and principles underlying key financial decisions, risk and return, the evaluation of projected capital investment and analysis of financial performance, for example. Management Accounting

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Business Environment

This module introduces you to economic theories and systems and relates these to the environment within which businesses function. You will further be equipped with the critical skills to apply the concepts and principles they study in a business context, you will be taught to consider the impact of government policies and actions on businesses and to look beyond national policies to the influence of wider economic and political groupings of states.

Finance, Investment & Banking

The main aim of this module is to provide you with an introduction to corporate finance. You will examine the concepts and principles underlying key financial decisions, risk and return, the evaluation of projected capital investment and analysis of financial performance, for example. The module further offers insights into the nature of the financial instruments, financial markets and



financial intermediaries, with particular focus on the banking business.

Management in Context

The main aim of this module is to develop a greater understanding of some of the key activities and functions associated with establishing and managing a business. It considers the legal bases of different types of businesses and, within these, the nature and impact of different styles of management and leadership. You will be introduced to the fields of operations management and organisational behaviour within business and consider how businesses introduce and manage change.

Quantitative Methods for Business

The module covers common statistical techniques for managerial decision-making which are used in many businesses. The module offers a grounding in statistics with an emphasis on practical applications and extensive use of the Excel spreadsheet and its associated functions. Devise methods of collecting, collating and displaying data.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Core modules include:

Research Methods

During this module students will learn about deploying the scientific method in planning, undertaking and interpreting research within Psychology.

Scientific Communication

During this module students will learn about the scientific method and the importance within a scientific context of conveying information in a clear and effective manner with due regard to the style, language, format and conventions appropriate to scientific discourse.

Personality and Individual Differences

This module addresses key topics within the field of personality, intelligence and individual differences. The module is split into two parts: intelligence and personality and each will be assessed separately. The areas covered involve historic and current perspectives on personality, including psychoanalysis, humanistic and trait approaches. Individual

differences and intelligence will be explored including intelligence testing, emotional intelligence and heritability of intelligence.

Professional Studies Project

The content of this module will include an introduction to the place of reflective practice across the professions and an exploration of the concept of person-centred practice in relation to own professional context. Group based discussions will take place to encourage a sharing of the range of experiences the students bring to the whole group and a collaborative approach to learning.

Concepts in Psychology

The emphasis of this module will be on providing students with a conceptual and historical understanding of psychology and how it has developed into the academic discipline that it is today. The focus of the course will be on theoretical understandings of psychology – how psychology as a science pursues discovery of new things through experimentation and scientific endeavour, this course will focus on how these findings are understood and interpreted

using classic and contemporary theories.

Introduction to the Welsh Context

The aim of the module is to introduce students to the largely public settings in which psychological services are planned and delivered to clients in Wales. This will enable students coming to Bangor to study courses in professional subjects to understand and contextualise the learning more effectively.

If you are not studying Pre-Sessional English prior to the main course you should have achieved an IELTS or equivalent
