UKRI is inviting proposals for short-term projects (up to 18 months) addressing and mitigating the social, economic, and cultural impacts of the COVID-19 outbreak. This is potentially an excellent way to boost your grant capture, engagement and impact, as well as to help fight COVID-19.

There is no closing date - applications are assessed on a rolling basis - and can be applied for at any time. Grants will be awarded at 80% of the full economic cost (fEC) for Research Council funding. The proposal must demonstrate the following:

- · new research or innovation with a clear impact pathway that has the potential (within the period of the grant) to deliver a significant contribution to the understanding of, and response to, the COVID-19 pandemic and its impacts.
- · gathers critical data and resources quickly for future research use

Award to Bangor Business School

- Marie Curie Fellowship

Yener Altunbas, is a professor of Banking at Bangor University Business School. His main research interests are the study of European banks, bank efficiency, monetary policy, corporate governance, electoral studies, and regional and urban economics. Professor Altunbaş is currently a consultant for ECB, BIS and he is collaborating on research projects with other colleagues at the International Monetary Fund (IMF). Recently, he has been acting as a Commonwealth Scholarships Academic Adviser. He holds a PhD from the University of Wales.

Md Atiqur Rahman Khan is an Associate Professor at the Department of Finance, University of Rajshahi, Bangladesh. He also has experience in teaching and administrative activities(R&D) at the Faculty of Business, Curtin University, Malaysia. His research interests include banking system resilience, banking regulations and risk management, sustainability and issues in financial system, and macroeconomic dynamics.

The Project

Environmental damages could affect the safety and soundness of banks, and also financial stability, and thus increase the systemic risk. Hence, economic activities and welfare would suffer greatly. The proposed research is cutting-edge as it is designed to investigate, through empirical analysis, the unrevealed interconnections among the topical issues – environmental sustainability matters, stability of the banking system, and systemic risk. Therefore, the proposed research aims to find empirical support for the explicit acknowledgment of environmental risk as an emerging source of systemic risk.
