PATHWAY COURSES

International Incorporated Bachelors (IIB)

International Year Zero (IYZ)

The IYZ at BUIC is the first year of a 4-year integrated degree course. IYZ provides 1-year of preparation for entry into the first year of a 3-year bachelor's degree at Bangor University.



International Year One (IY1)

The IY1 at BUIC is the first year of a 3-year integrated degree course. IY1 is equivalent to the first year of a 3-year bachelor's degree, leading to direct entry into the second year of a bachelor's degree at Bangor University.



International Incorporated Masters (IIM)

The IIM at BUIC is an integrated degree course, providing either 1 term or 2 terms of preparation for entry into a 1-year master's degree in accounting, banking, business, finance or psychology at Bangor University.



Careers advice

The Careers Service offers a variety of resources to help you find your perfect career. Students can request a confidential personal career advice session, attend any of our workshops, and make use of online resources tailored to each subject.

Workshops and events

Internships






CAMPUS MAP AND FACILITIES



OVERVIEW

The International Year Zero (IYZ) is the first year of a 4-year IIB. Your first year is taught at the International College (BUIC). Once you successfully complete this year, you will continue studying the remaining stages of your degree at Bangor University.

During the three terms encapsulating the IYZ, you'll gain additional skills in your chosen study route and the necessary English language skills to succeed during your studies.



To enrol onto the IYZ pathway you must meet the following entry requirements.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

For direct entry to the IYZ pathway the minimum overall IELTS score requirement is

5.5 with no skill less than 5.5

Our IYZ in Business and Management will give you an excellent grounding in the basics of business, encompassing key economic, legal and management principles. You will also develop maths skills that are vital for your degree studies.

BANGOR BUSINESS SCHOOL

Bangor Business School is a leading teaching and research centre with a prestigious reputation. Your chosen degree course will set you on the path to a dream career in the world of business or finance. Graduates of many business-related degree courses are eligible for exemptions from modules and examinations if you wish to take a further professional qualification in marketing or accountancy such as ACCA or CIM accreditation.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Compulsory modules include:

Business Functions

A basic introduction to the study of business and management, this module introduces the function of business in different types of organisations. It considers issues around the liberalisation of trade and the development of the global market and how they have affected businesses and the emergence of the international manager.

Business Law

Providing you with a functional knowledge of the basic rights and liabilities in law affecting modern businesses, this module covers types of business entity, such as partnerships and companies. You will learn about the legal system in England and Wales, including the small

claims track, and the rights and responsibilities of businesses in this legal framework.

Financial Accounting

Covering the basic mechanics and processes of financial accounting in theory and practice. this module prepares you for the later years of vour dearee studies in Business Management and Accounting and Finance. It will also give you an understanding of financial accounting procedures and their importance in monitoring progress and profitability to run a business effectively.

Macroeconomics

Familiarising you with the UK economy and government policy, this module also introduces key macroeconomic indicators, including GDP per capita, price indices and balance of payments. You'll learn about fiscal and monetary policy aims, the desire for growth and the relationship between policy and rates of inflation, deflation and unemployment. National goals are viewed in

the context of broader groupings such as the EU, and the impact of the global market.

Management Studies

In this module, you'll receive a basic introduction to the study of business and management. You'll learn the different types of businesses and organisations, as well as how to finance a start-up. The module also illustrates different approaches to management and explains decision-making processes.

Data Analysis

In this module, you will learn the maths skills expected of you at degree level. It covers essential mathematical language, notation, conventions and units, as well as developing your algebraic skills and introducing you to basic statistical concepts, topics and methods.

Microeconomics

Providing a basic introduction to the study of Microeconomics, this module introduces relevant theories, concepts and terminology as well as explaining key topics such as demand and supply, the economic problem and the allocation of scarce resources.

ENGINEERING AND COMPUTER SCIENCE

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Covering the major mathematical and scientific principles, this course gives you a great start in engineering and computing. With a heavy focus on maths, physics and programming, you will deepen your understanding of these subjects during your foundation year.

After finishing the course, you will continue your studies in either our School of Computer Science where you will obtain a BSc degree that is accredited by the British Computer Society or you will join our School of Electronic Engineering with its range of specialist courses. Our BEng degree courses, which are accredited by the Institution of Engineering and Technology, can set you on the road to Chartered Engineer Status.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Compulsory modules include:

Computing 1 (Problem Solving and Programming)

Introducing you to problem solving via computer applications, you'll develop a basic understanding of algorithms and their uses, as well as gaining hands-on experience using simple software programs to solve problems. You will receive a basic introduction to the techniques of data handling and processing, and to the syntax of programming languages required for a computing degree.

Computing 2 (Database Design and Usage)

This module is a practical introduction to the technology and terminology around tabular data, and the construction and use of a database. You will develop a database for a given situation – for example, a simulated business using current standards and

appropriate software – and use that database to identify and solve problems.

Physics 1 (Properties of Matter and Waves)

In this module, you'll gain a basic knowledge of atomic physics, materials, heat and gases, and oscillations and waves. There is a heavy emphasis on safe laboratory practice and procedures. The main topics covered are: properties of waves; sound; reflection and refraction; interference and diffraction; and electromagnetic waves.

Physics 2 (Electricity and Fields)

This module provides you with a basic knowledge of electricity and electronics, and of fields, that you will be able to apply in real engineering and computing situations. You will learn about current and charge, Ohm's Law, capacitors in DC circuits, measuring AC, transistors and logic circuits.

Maths 1 (Pure)

This module provides you with the appropriate foundation in maths skills that you need for undergraduate studies in engineering and computer science. The main topics covered are: algebra, including indices and logarithms; quadratic equations; differential calculus; integration as the inverse of differentiation; and set theory.

Maths 2 (Applied)

Continuing to develop your maths skills and knowledge. this module introduces you to the relationships between forces, linear motion and energy, and the conditions for the static equilibrium of a body. The main topics it covers are: vectors: forces and equilibrium: relative motion: Newton's Laws of Motion: and friction. The module also covers the basic statistics skills for undergraduate study introducing averages, probability, normal distribution and correlation.

Maths 3 (Further)

This module covers complex mathematical skills and knowledge, such as: algebra, including partial fractions and inverse functions; sequences and series; the circle; trigonometry; differentiation and integration, including

trigonometric, and logarithmic and exponential functions; and solving first-order differential equations with separable variables, vector and vector methods in two and three dimensions.

Business Law

Providing you with a functional knowledge of the basic rights and liabilities in law affecting modern businesses, this module covers types of business entity, such as partnerships and companies.

Legal Systems of England and Wales - Core for progression to Law degrees

Introducing key features of the legal systems of England and Wales, this module covers its principles and processes. You will learn about the different types and levels of court, including the jury system and the roles of judges, barristers, solicitors and court officials, as well as processes around civil and criminal cases.

Macroeconomics

Familiarising you with the UK economy and

government policy, this module also introduces key macroeconomic indicators, including GDP per capita, price indices and balance of payments.

Management Studies

In this module, you'll receive a basic introduction to the study of business and management. You'll learn the different types of businesses and organisations, as well as how to finance a start-up.

Data Analysis

In this module, you will learn the maths skills expected of you at degree level. It covers essential mathematical language, notation, conventions, as well as developing your algebraic skills and introducing you to basic statistical concepts, topics and methods.

Providing a basic introduction to the study of Microeconomics, this module introduces relevant theories, concepts and terminology as well as explaining key topics such as demand and supply, the economic problem and the allocation of scarce resources.

Media Studies (Film and TV) - Core for progression to Media degrees


This module aims to broaden your knowledge of critical and cultural theory in media. You will develop an understanding of the theoretical aspects of film and TV production, with an emphasis on story-telling.

Psychology 1 (Theory) -Core for progression to Psychology degrees

This module introduces the main theoretical approaches to Psychology and consider its historical development as a field of study; to build awareness of key ideas and concepts; and to focus on the areas of Social, Cognitive and Developmental Psychology.

Business, Management and Marketing at Bangor ranked 23rd Best in the UK

Our IY1 course is the first year of a business management and marketing related degree. You will learn core subjects relating to business economics, operations and information systems management, as well as marketing. On successful completion, you will continue on to the second year of your chosen undergraduate degree with Bangor Business School.

In this module you will develop and apply academic and study skills, including the skills of synthesising source material, presenting analysis and production of a final extended research essay with bibliography, and the delivery of a group-based presentation.

Introduction to Business and Marketing

Introduction to Management Accounting



Introduction to Economic Analysis

This module emphasizes the importance of efficient management and exploring opportunities beyond existing resources in understanding the interconnectedness between management, enterprises, and entrepreneurship. It aims to enhance students' comprehension of fundamental concepts, facilitating their success at Bangor Business School.

Introduction to Financial Accounting

The module helps students familiarise themselves with accounting terminology and fundamental concepts, pick up accounting as a business language, and enhance their employability. It also introduces a basic accounting technique, record keeping, accounting rules and how the profession is governed and evolves over time.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

You will study a number of modules throughout the duration of your course.

Compulsory modules include:

Applied Psychology

This module looks at ways in which psychological training, theory and research can apply to reallife situations. In addition to clinical, educational psychology and counselling. you will also look at forensic psychology, the impact of psychological insights in the world of business and management and urban planning. The module will show how an understanding of human attitudes. reactions and behaviours influences decision-making in all these areas.

Behavioural Psychology

You will consider the link between behaviour and the mind, conditioning and the interaction with the environment. What defines rational and abnormal behaviour and why behaviours are so difficult to influence or adjust are discussed. Additionally, this course reviews mental health problems, including stress, anomalistic psychology and the experience of the paranormal. You will also consider positive psychology and the science of happiness and wellbeing.

Biological Psychology

You will learn the principles of biological psychology, considering the anatomy of the brain and how the brain influences the mind, so affecting behaviour. You will examine the different location of mental functions and behaviours and how the brain may be affected by injury or neurological disorder. Elements of cognitive psychology are explored, including memory and language acquisition.

Research Methods for Psychology

This module aims to introduce you to the research methods and statistics used within Psychology. You will learn about using the correct

scientific method for planning, undertaking and interpreting research.

Scientific Communication

This module teaches you how to communicate within a scientific setting clearly and effectively, both in writing and verbally. You will study scientific texts and listen to lectures and write summaries of what you learnt from this. This style of learning will provide you with the opportunities to demonstrate your understanding of and ability to engage with scientific writing. Students will also be required to work in groups, discussing current Psychology topics.

Social Psychology

This module will look into psychological theories in Social Psychology. Students will get an introduction into interpersonal relationships, attitude formation, structure and change, social influence and group dynamics. This course allows students to explore human behaviour in a social and cultural context.

Introduction to Psychology

This course provides an overview of the development of psychology as a field of study, exploring its origins in philosophy and medicine. It examines various historical and psychological approaches and their relevance to current issues. The course covers a wide range of topics, including the causes of antisocial behaviour, the nature of memory, and the impact of stress on individuals. Additionally, the course delves into the biology of the brain and theories of cognitive development.

Auditing - 2 term only

This module considers the importance to a business of the monitoring of its financial performance. both in terms of meeting the requirements of the regulatory environment within which businesses operate and of providing information of a company's performance and its financial standing to its executives and shareholders. The external auditing process is reviewed, including evidence requiring to be produced, compliance tests and substantive tests, analytical review and computer-assisted audit techniques, completion checklist and the final auditor's report and the need for properly submitted accounts to the Registrar of Companies.

Financial Accounting

The aim of this module is to provide an introduction to accounting in terms of theory and practice and covers the main applications of ICT to financial accounting. Research Methods (Psychology)

During this module students will learn about deploying the scientific method in planning, undertaking and interpreting research within Psychology.

Scientific Communication

During this module students will learn about the scientific method and the importance. Within a scientific context, of conveying information in a clear and effective manner with due regard to the style, language, format and conventions appropriate to scientific discourse.

Personality and Individual Differences

- 2 term only

This module addresses key topics within the field of personality, intelligence and individual differences. The module is split into two parts: intelligence and personality and each will be assessed separately. The areas covered involve historic and current perspectives on personality, including psychoanalysis, humanistic and trait approaches. Individual differences and intelligence will be explored including intelligence testing, emotional intelligence and heritability of intelligence.

Concepts in Psychology - 2 term only

The emphasis of this module will be on providing students with a conceptual and historical understanding of psychology and how it has developed into the academic discipline that it is today. The focus of the course will be on theoretical understandings of psychology - how psychology as a science pursues discovery of new things through experimentation and scientific endeavour. This course will focus on how these findings are understood and interpreted using classic and contemporary theories.

Cognitive Neuropsychology - 2 term only

This module aims to help students understand the principles of biological psychology. The module covers the brain's anatomy. how it influences behaviour. and the different mental functions the brain is responsible for. The module also explores the various elements of cognitive psychology, such as memory and language acquisition and how injuries or neurological disorders can affect the brain.


Research Statistics (Psychology)

This module aims to familiarize students with the statistical methods utilized in research activities. This will enable them to gain expertise in statistical software and packages, which will aid in data analysis. WHAT HAPPENS AFTER YOU SUBMIT YOUR APPLICATION?

STAGE 1: CHECK QUALIFICATIONS
