Fera to be part of joint venture

A joint venture between the Food and Environment Research Agency (Fera), Newcastle University and financial backer Capita, which began on 1 April, secures £14.5 million of new investment in the agency.

Announcing the move in February, Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Elizabeth Truss (pictured) said: "The joint venture is part of Defra's ambitious science programme and is recognition of the importance of cuttingedge research."

The investment adds to the £2.7m already committed by the Local Enterprise Partnership to Defra's National Agri-Food



Innovation Campus in York, where Fera is based, and includes a joint academic institute with Newcastle University aimed at applying science to practical agri-food problems.

It allows Fera to continue to provide the invaluable scientific services that Defra and wider Government will require in the future, including those for plant health.

Countryside productivity scheme now open

Woodland owners and forestry contractors can now apply for grants under the Countryside Productivity Scheme, part of the Rural Development Programme for England. The programme is administered by the Rural Payments Agency and applicants will need to register online.
